WHEREAS, the revitalization project is now complete and the symphonic organ rededication season has commenced. The Skinner organ was recently utilized in a three-part Osher Lifelong Learning Institute course and in the noonday recital aural tour series, which drew more than fifty participants to the Cathedral District; and

WHEREAS, the City of Saginaw is proud to participate in the celebration of this noble cultural initiative, including the special dedication service with international recitalist Frederick Swann.

Manager's Recommendation:

I recommend approval of the following changes to the 2014–2015 Personnel Complement, provided under separate cover. Such changes stem from efforts to structure employee job duties and responsibilities in such ways as to continue the delivery of City services while attempting to reduce costs where appropriate.

Justification:

All job vacancies are examined by the Management Review Team to ensure appropriate staffing levels at appropriate wages. The result of this current examination is a total staffing increase of 0.96 Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) employee but with base wage cost savings of \$103,251. The cost of adding any new positions is primarily offset by the deletion of other positions. Further cost reductions were also realized by the reallocation of some positions and by increased revenue generation.

Manager's Recommendation:

I recommend approval of the service agreement between the City of Saginaw and CMI, A York Risk Services Company Inc., to adjudicate, manage and administer workers compensation claims for the City of Saginaw. This agreement has been approved by me as to substance and the City Attorney as to form. It is also recommended that the City Council authorize the City Manager or his designee to sign all documents related to this agreement.

Justification:

The City of Saginaw provides workers compensation benefits to all employees as mandated by the State of Michigan. The City's workers compensation program is self-funded and utilizes a Third Party Administrator (TPA) for Claims management. The current vendor's contract expires on June 30, 2014. The City sent out proposals to several Michigan based Workers Compensation TPA's and Selected CMI to manage the workers compensation claims beginning July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2017.

CMI is the largest TPA in the State of Michigan and located in Howell. The service agreement alone will reduce the administrative fees by \$41,000 over a three year period. CMI also has the largest volume of municipal business in the country and has an average cost per claim for their municipal business of \$4,000 as compared to our current average cost per claim at \$8,000. The reduced average cost per claim will have a significant impact on our indemnity and medical claims costs going forward.

The City will also utilize an independent agent that specializes in self-funded workers compensation programs. Creative Benefits and Insurance Solutions will bring another level of review and recommendations to assist the City in reducing the Worker Compensation costs that has a current budget of \$1.3 million dollars for 2014/2015.

Following the MDOT requirements, Wade Trim was selected based on the quality of their proposal.

On October 23, 2013, Council approved a cost agreement with the Michigan Department of Transportation ("MDOT") for preliminary engineering design services for the signal optimization which allows the City to be reimbursed for 80% of the preliminary engineering costs, or \$128,416, with Federal Surface Transportation Hazard Elimination (STH) funds. The City is responsible for \$32,104 and any cost overruns over \$160,520 will be the responsibility of the City. The City is now required to enter into an MDOT Third Party Agreement with Wade Trim for preliminary engineering services for the traffic signal optimization.

Wade Trim Associates, Inc. meets all the requirements of §"Vendors", of "Purchasing, Contracting, and Selling Procedure," of Chapter 14, "Finance and Purchasing", of Title I, "General Provisions," of the Saginaw Code of Ordinances, O-1.

Funds for the preliminary engineering services are budgeted and available in the FY14 Major Streets Fund – Streets Projects Division's, Engineering Services Account No. 202-4614-802.000 (\$94,520), and will be budgeted and made available in the same account in FY15 (\$66,000).

The Wastewater Treatment Plant has often equipped many of their pumps with variable speed drives. Variable speed drives reduce pump wear and provide substantial energy savings. Standardizing drives allows us to stock fewer repair parts and provides for more options in case of equipment failure. The quote is for the replacement for two eleven year old drives on our return active sludge pumps which have failed. Because of the importance of this equipment, an emergency purchase order was requested in order to minimize equipment down time.
