

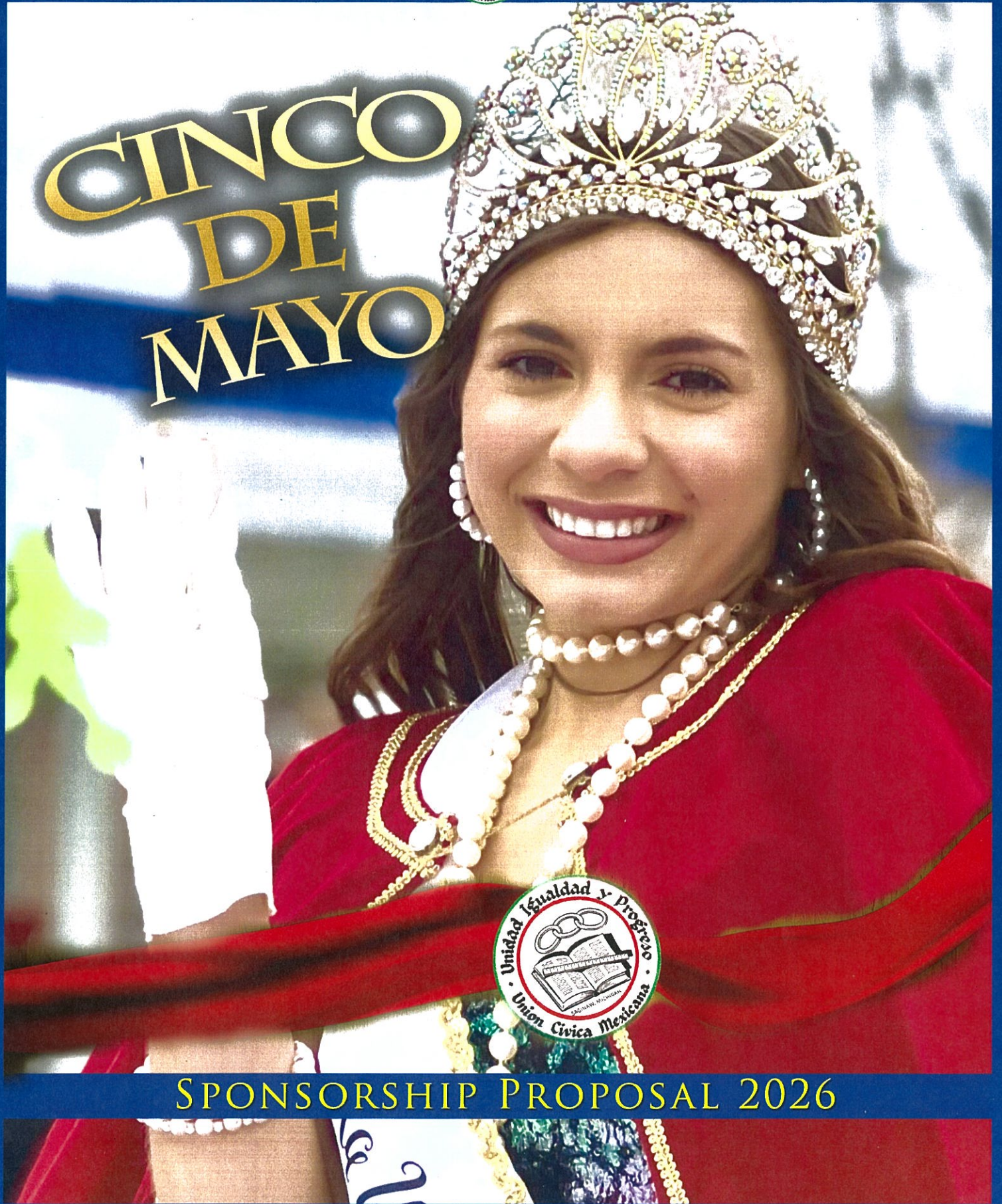

# Saginaw Cinco de Mayo parade a festival of familia, attendees say

SAGINAW, MI — For some, the annual downtown Saginaw Cinco de Mayo parade doubles as a family reunion.

Thousands of spectators gathered in the morning hours of Saturday, May 6, to watch about 100 parade entrants drive, dance, throw candy and play music down a 2-mile stretch of South Washington Avenue.

Many members of the crowd sat or stood side-by-side with their mothers, sons, sisters and cousins in what has developed into a community tradition that stretches back generations — sometimes to the very earliest parades organized in Saginaw about four decades ago.

Della Chantaca, 92, began coming to the Saginaw Cinco de Mayo parade in the 1980s. Several of her relatives regularly participate in the 2-mile trek down South Washington Avenue, between Ezra Rust Drive and Johnson Street. Her nephew is Larry Rodarte, chairperson of the La Unión Cívica Mexicana group that organizes the typically-annual event. Her great-great niece is Priscilla Garcia, a Saginaw City Council member.

On Saturday, Chantaca gathered with about 10 members of her family at the corner of South Washington and Janes Avenue to watch.

“I love seeing all the Latinos come out like this,” said Chantaca, a Saginaw native whose late parents were born in Mexico. “It’s very important to me to see Latinos gather like this. It’s part of our heritage. I’m really glad to be here.”

Chantaca said she was especially fond of the musicians that perform during the parade, including the high school bands that play and dance as the participants move down the street.

Vicky Godinez, 66, also considers



watching and participating in the annual downtown parade a family tradition. She said she was in attendance for about 20 of the last 30 city parades.

When she’s in attendance, she travels from her home in Bay City to huddle with her children or sisters to watch the festivities.

On Saturday, she sat with her daughter at the intersection of South Washington and East Genesee Avenue. Godinez’s grandson participated in the parade Saturday.

Her late parents also originated from Mexico, although they were first introduced to parades as part of Cinco de Mayo celebrations when they moved to Michigan, she said.

“Our parents led us to where we are,” Godinez said. “They taught us, ‘Don’t leave your roots behind.’ We come here to celebrate those roots.”

James Rueda, 59, typically participates in the parade to represent his business, Jimmy Wheels Auto Detailing in Saginaw.

On Saturday, though, he decided to remain a spectator, watching from the tailgate of his truck parked near the

East Genesee Avenue intersection. He said it was just as meaningful to see families gathered for the festivities as it was to see the parade participants.

“There’s so much joy and happiness when you come to this,” said Rueda, who first participated in the parade when he was in the 11th grade. “There’s so much camaraderie. Everybody gets along.”

Jordon Olivarez, a 31-year-old Saginaw man, brought his three daughters and son Saturday. His earliest memory of the Saginaw parade was as a 10-year-old boy.

“It means a lot that now I can bring my kids to this, and they can enjoy this just like I did when I was younger,” Olivarez said.

The Saginaw Fire Department led the parade, where firefighters pulled on the vehicle’s horn and engaged its emergency siren, drawing cheers and waves from the crowds that packed both sides of the street.

Among the participants that seemed to attract the most attention were the vehicles blasting Latin music, the Saginaw County sheriff’s deputies riding their horses, a Saginaw Boxing Club float that included a simulated sparring match, and the Saginaw High School marching band.

Attendees set up folded chairs on the adjoining sidewalks as early as two hours before the parade’s 10 a.m. launch. As the morning progressed and candy continued to be thrown, though, many people stepped out onto the street to congregate near the center turn lane.

The parade concluded nearly two hours after it launched, with many spectators then filing into nearby Jolt Credit Union Event Park, where festivities continued with live music acts and food vendors.

Rodarte stepped up to help organize this year's event when officials at the Union Civica Mexicana asked for his help amid financial struggles, he said.

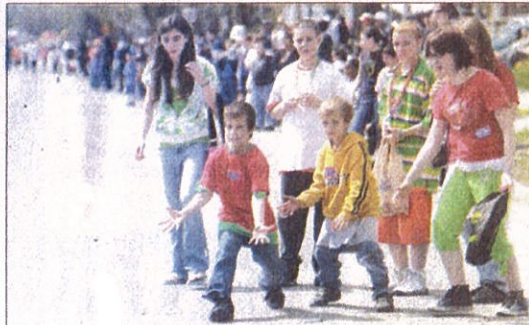

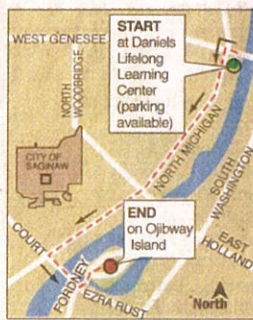
### Festival's theme: Yes we can

Cinco De Mayo Festival Chairman Larry J. Rodarte took control of this year's celebration when a Hispanic organization feared the event might die.

Rodarte said officials at Union Civica Mexicana have struggled recently to pay utility bills and considered closing the group's building at 2715 Wadsworth in Saginaw.

They contemplated scrapping Cinco De Mayo festivities and throwing a "Save the Civica" dance instead.

That's when Rodarte stepped in after urging

from the group and began injecting this year's theme into the community: Si se puede! or Yes we can! — the famous words of migrant labor leader Cesar E. Chavez.

"President Obama started using it during the election. We said, 'We are going to steal it back,'" joked Rodarte, 44, publisher and editor of Mi Gente, a Saginaw-based Latino magazine. "We said yes, we can get these organizations together in the community."

Rodarte helped gather the

# Cívica Giving Back



La Unión Cívica Mexicana has a grand history as a Civic organization for nearly 80 years propagating Mexican/Latino culture and heritage for the community. Founded in 1945, it started as a Civil Rights organization fighting the discrimination of its day specifically towards the migrant farm workers.

Today the organization advocates for issues pertaining to civil rights for all people.

1) High on the founders agenda was educational attainment for their youth. And today since 2010, the Cívica has given away **educational scholarships** to their youth, particularly ladies who represent the organization as their Reina (queen) and her court, \$15,000 to date.

2) The group also advocates for the migrant farmworkers, and has worked with The Great Lakes Bay Health Centers; cooking food and selling dinners to help raise \$3,500 donated to help kick off **Migrant Health Services** in the Great Lakes Bay Region.

3) The Unión Cívica also assisted in cooking **free meals to elderly** individuals during the first two months of the Covid Pandemic. Working with different churches, every Saturday the group cooked 200 dinners of their specialties in Mexican food for those who had difficulty getting out in the community.

4) Advocating for the **“Get out the Vote”** campaign and the **Necessity for Vaccines** was also a priority for the group, with videos produced by the Cívica while working with the LLEAD (Latino Leaders for the Enhancement of Advocacy and Development) organization statewide.

5) The group has been a staple for area youth, too, to provide a source for **volunteering** at our events and food sales, to give them community hours.

6) Also, when GM workers went on strike in 2019, the Cívica members **stood in solidarity and fed striking workers** camped out in the First Ward Community Center’s parking lot with their popular deep fried tacos called patitos.

7) The Cívica Hall has also been used for **benefit dances**, when community members are in need or when collections were made for **household items and clothing for flood victims** in Midland and Sanford.

8) One of the great achievements that the Union Cívica is proud of in giving back is their involvement with **Christmas With Angels** for the last seven years. The angel program gives to needy children during the holiday and to date has assisted over 1,000 kids.

9) The Cívica was also instrumental last year to raise \$4,000 in an event entitled “5 Men Who Can Cook” to help open a Men’s shelter called **The WELL** in Saginaw.

10) Lastly, above all, members are happy to provide staple events for several years to not only the Hispanic Community but the greater community at large. In 2024, the **45th annual Cinco de Mayo** will be celebrated with the largest parade in Saginaw County. It is estimated that 5,000 people attend this event that brings great economic development to downtown Saginaw and small businesses. Also, the **3rd annual Saginaw Taco Fest**, the **15th Annual Dia De Los Muertos Celebration** and the **13th Annual Tamale Taste-Off**—all events that have hundreds attend, and help make our Great Lakes Bay Region more diverse with beautiful cultural celebrations. We are proud to be a part of the Saginaw community!
